Terutomo Ozawa received an MBA and a PhD from Columbia University, USA. He was, *inter alia*, a research associate at MIT's center for Policy Alternatives, USA (1975–76 academic year); an invited visiting scholar at Cambridge University's Faculty of Economics and Politics, UK (1982–83 academic year); an Esmee Fairbairn Senior Research Fellow, University of Reading, UK (May 1983); a senior professional fellow, Japan Foundation, Japan (June–August 1987); a John M. Olin Distinguished Visiting Professor at Colorado School of Mines, USA (fall semester 1987); a short-term visiting professor at the University of Paris I (Sorbonne), France, a few times over May 1993 to January 1998; a visiting professor at Tokyo University's Institute of Social Science, Japan (fall semester 1996); a visiting senior research fellow at the East-West Center, Hawaii, USA (February–April 2001); and a visiting professor at International Christian University, Tokyo, Japan (spring quarter 2004).

His current research interest is in multinational corporations, economic development and structural change, and global political economy. He was president of the International Trade and Finance Association in 2003.
