Professor Yong-Shik Lee is an academician, lawyer (USA and UK), and former government counsel. An expert in international trade law, he has counseled and represented governments, law firms, and consulting firms, as well as private individuals in the matters of international trade and investment.

Lee studied economics at the University of California at Berkeley (A.B.) and law at the University of Cambridge (B.A., M.A., Ph.D). He began his professional career as a Legal Counsel for the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade of Korea and later entered academia. He is currently Professor and Chair of International Economic Law at the University of Manchester and Director of the Law and Development Institute. Lee handled the first WTO panel case on safeguards and appeared at the hearings of the WTO panel and the Appellate Body. He has also participated in the multilateral and bilateral negotiations relating to international trade and investment, including the negotiations at the United Nations Commission on International Trade Law (UNCITRAL) and the bilateral investment treaty (BIT) negotiations between South Korea and Japan.

Lee has authored and co-authored several volumes of books including *Reclaiming Development in the World Trading System* (Cambridge University Press, 2006, 2009), *Law and Development Perspective on International Trade Law* (Cambridge University Press, 2011), and *Microtrade: A New System of International Trade with Volunteerism towards Poverty Elimination* (Routledge, 2013), and contributed to other major treatises, such as *The World Trade Organization: Legal, Economic and Political Analysis* (Springer, 2005). He is considered one of the foremost authorities on safeguard measures. He has frequently been invited to speak on the issues of safeguard measures as well as on other issues of international trade law at some of the most prominent academic forums, such as Harvard University Kennedy School of Government and Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies. His numerous articles have appeared in various leading journals, including *Journal of World Trade*, *Minnesota Journal of International Law*, *Northwestern Journal of International Law and Business*, *University of Pennsylvania*

East Asia Law Review, *Arizona Journal of International and Comparative Law*, and the *Law and Development Review*. Lee is currently the editor-in-chief of the *Law and Development Review* and an associate editor of the *Journal of World Trade*.
