Benoît Mayer is an Assistant Professor in the Faculty of Law in the Chinese University of Hong Kong. He is also a member of the Centre for International Sustainable Development Law; the Earth System Governance project; the Hans & Tamar Oppenheimer Chair in Public International Law at McGill University's Faculty of Law; and the Asia-Pacific Centre for Environmental Law at the Faculty of Law of the National University of Singapore. Dr. Mayer has studied law and social sciences in Sciences Po Lyon and the Sorbonne University (France), the Viadrina University of Frankfurt/Oder (Germany), McGill University (Canada) and the National University of Singapore, where he obtained his PhD in law. From 2015 to 2016, he worked as an Associate Professor at the Institute Law Institute in the University of Wuhan, in China. His research, which is often interdisciplinary and critical, focuses on responses to climate change, in particular on the international plane and in emerging economies. An early-career scholar with great dedication and energy, Dr. Mayer has already gained recognition in his field through multiple peer-reviewed publications on climate migration, "loss and damage" resulting from climate change impacts in developing countries, and legal aspects of discourses on "climate justice."
