This book evolved out of two Corsica Law and Economics Workshops, respectively held in Marseilles (May 2003) and in Reims (May 2004). Scholars invited to give papers were given *carte blanche*, but were asked to revise their contributions after the conference discussions. Here we present a selection of those papers. The chapters reflect current research on the subject, unified by the same concern, namely understanding the law and economics dimension of European integration. They also show a diversity of opinions that we did not try to smooth. Underlying many contributions are strong preferences as to what the *jus commune* will be or should be in the future.
