**Yusong Chen** is currently a diplomat at the Permanent Mission of China to the WTO. Previously, he was a legal affairs officer in the Department of Treaties & Laws of China's Ministry of Commerce (MOFCOM). He participated in many Chinese legislative activities, including the drafting of China's Foreign Trade law, antidumping/CVD/safeguard regulations, and so on. As a negotiator, he participated in the WTO Doha negotiations, mainly focused on the issues of TRIPS (GIs and CBD) and rules (anti-dumping, subsidy and fisheries subsidies), as well as many bilateral trade negotiations, including China's FTA negotiations. He was also involved in the WTO dispute settlement proceedings on behalf of China. He holds an LLB in International Economic Law with magna cum laude from the Law School of Peking University (PKU) and a Diploma in Public Administration from China's National School of Administration (CNSA). He also has an LLM with distinction in EU and International Trade Law from Amsterdam Law School, Universiteit van Amsterdam (UvA). He has published various articles in the field of international economic law.

**Henrique Choer Moraes** is a career diplomat currently posted at the Permanent Mission of Brazil to the European Communities (Brussels), where he is in charge of following intellectual property issues as well as the work of the World Customs Organization (WCO). Prior to that, he worked at the Intellectual Property Division of Brazil's Ministry of External Relations, where he served from 2004 to 2007. In that capacity he took part in negotiations on patents, copyrights and intellectual property–biodiversity issues at the World Trade Organization, and the Convention on Biological Diversity. From 2000 to 2004 he worked as Professor of Public International Law at the University Ritter dos Reis, Porto Alegre (Brazil). He holds a Master's degree in integration and business international law from the Universidade Federal do Rio Grande do Sul (Porto Alegre).

**Carlos M. Correa** is Director of the Centre for Interdisciplinary Studies of Industrial Property Law and Economics of the University of Buenos Aires and of the Postgraduate Courses on Intellectual Property of the same university. From 1991 to 2004 he was the Director of the Master's Programme on Science and Technology Policy and Management. He is member of the Permanent Court of Review of MERCOSUR and has been a consultant to UNCTAD, UNIDO, WHO, FAO, Inter-American Development Bank and its unit INTAL, World Bank, SELA, ECLAC, UNDP and various other regional and international organizations as well as governments in different areas of law and economics, including investment, science and technology and intellectual property. He was a member of the UK International Commission on Intellectual Property, established in 2001. In 2004 he was appointed as member of the Commission on Intellectual Property Rights, Innovation and Public Health created by the World Health Assembly, as well as the FAO Panel of Eminent Experts on Ethics in Food and Agriculture. He currently chairs the Genetics Resources Policy Committee of the CGIAR. He is the author of several books and numerous articles on law and economics, particularly on investment, technology and intellectual property.

**Henning Grosse Ruse-Khan** is a Research Fellow at the Max Planck Institute for Intellectual Property, Competition and Tax Law in Munich since 2007. His research focuses on new approaches for balancing private rights and public interests in international economic law, in particular intellectual property protection. Formerly, he was a Lecturer in International Trade Law at the University of Leicester (United Kingdom) and a research fellow at the Institute for Information, Telecommunication and Media Law (ITM) of the University of Münster on intellectual property and information technology law. He has also acted as a visiting scholar on WTO, International Trade and Intellectual Property Law at the International Islamic University in Islamabad (2004–05) and at the University of Frankfurt (2007). He has several publications on international trade and intellectual property law to his credit.

**Xuan Li** is Programme Coordinator of the Innovation, Access to Knowledge and Intellectual Property Programme (IAKP) at South Centre in Switzerland, an intergovernmental organization and think tank of developing countries. She is the Director of the

South Centre Distance Learning Course on 'Intellectual Property Policy and Development', jointly implemented with the United Nations Institute for Training and Research (UNITAR), and a member of the Editorial Committee of *South Bulletin: Reflections and Foresights*. She has been a consultant to a number of national and intergovernmental organizations, including the World Health Organization, the Food and Agriculture Organization, the Chinese Ministry of Commerce, the Chinese State Intellectual Property Office, the State Administration of Traditional Chinese Medicine, and the World Trade Institute, among others. She has worked on international trade, intellectual property and development issues for the Asian Development Bank and ICTSD, and was Lead Economist of the South Centre. She has also been actively involved in the Chinese National Strategic Formulation on Intellectual Property Rights. She is the author of several books and numerous articles on intellectual property, law and economics, particularly on innovation, enforcement, technology, traditional knowledge, IP standardization, philosophy and literature.

**Viviana Muñoz Tellez** is a Programme Officer at the South Centre. She conducts policy-oriented research on innovation, access to knowledge and intellectual property policy. Previously she worked at the Queen Mary Intellectual Property Research Institute, London. She has also worked as a consultant to the United Nations Industrial Development Organization and various non-governmental organizations. **Joshua D. briefs in the US Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit on important patent law issues, has been a pro bono mediator for the Federal Circuit, and has been a consultant to the UNCTAD on intellectual property, trade and environmental issues. Mr Sarnoff was formerly in private practice in Washington, DC, and previously taught at the University of Arizona College of Law.

**Hong Xue** is a Professor of Law at Beijing Normal University and Research Fellow of the Information Society Project of Yale Law School. Previously, she was the Associate Professor of the Faculty of Law, University of Hong Kong. Dr Xue specializes in intellectual property law, information technology law and the Internet governance. Dr Xue was elected as one of the Ten Nationally Distinguished Young Jurists by the China Law Society and granted the Special Governmental Allowance for prominent contribution to social science by the State Council of the People's Republic of China. She was also the awardee of the Outstanding Young Researcher Award of the University of Hong Kong. She has published widely in both Chinese and international journals. She works in many governmental and non-governmental organizations. She is the only Asian Scholar in the Executive Committee of the International Association for Promotion of the Advanced Teaching and Research of Intellectual Property (ATRIP) and the Editorial Board of *The Journal of World Intellectual Property*. She was a founding member of the ICANN At-Large Advisory Committee from 2003 to 2007, and she is now a member of the ICANN Nomination Committee and the President's Advisory Committee on Internationalized Domain Names. She is also one of the founders of the Internet Users Organization in the Asia-Pacific Region.
