**Horacio Aguirre** is a researcher on issues related to macroeconomic and monetary policy, having published articles and working papers on the subjects of monetary regimes in developing economies, monetary aggregates forecasting, and the financial position of households in Argentina, among others. He holds a BA in Economics from the University of Buenos Aires, an MA in Economics from Torcuato Di Tella University and is a doctoral candidate in Economics from San Andrés University. He is also a Lecturer at the University of Buenos Aires.

**Edmund Amann** is Reader in Development Economics at the University of Manchester, UK. He is also Adjunct Professor at the School for Advanced International Studies (SAIS) of the Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, MD, USA. He is the author of many articles on economic development, with special emphasis on Brazil and technology. His books include *Economic Liberalization and Industrial Performance in Brazil* (Oxford, 2000) and *Regulating Economic Development: Lessons from Africa and Latin America* (Cheltenham, 2007).

**Daniel G. Arce M.** is Professor of Economics and Program Head at the University of Texas – Dallas, USA. He has published numerous articles on game theory, collective action, business ethics, (counter-) terrorism, and Latin American economies. He has won the inaugural Thomas Fellowship of Teaching Excellence at the Culverhouse College of Commerce and Business Administration (University of Alabama), the Dean's Award for Research and Creative Activity at Rhodes College and the Alumni Achievement Award at Western Michigan University. He has received two Fulbright grants for study and research in Latin America. Professor Arce is the editor of *Defense and Peace Economics* and is on the editorial board of the *The Southern Economic Journal*.

**Carlos R. Azzoni** is Professor of Economics at the University of São Paulo, Brazil, and was Dean of the School of Economics, Administration and Accounting there from 2006 to 2010. He was also Visiting Professor at Cornell University, Ohio State University and the University of Illinois, USA. His area of research is economic inequality in general, with a focus

on regional inequality. He has chaired the Regional Planning Division of the state of São Paulo Secretariat of Planning for seven years. He has published seven books (in Portuguese) and over 50 papers in Brazilian and international refereed journals.

**Carlos José Caetano Bacha** is currently Professor of Economics at the University of São Paulo at Piracicaba (Esalq), Brazil. He has published extensively on such topics as economic development and policies concerning agriculture and forests.

**Werner Baer** is the Lemann Professor of Economics at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, USA. He is the author of many articles and books dealing with Latin American economic development, with special emphasis on Brazil. These include *The Brazilian Economy: Growth and Development*, 6th edition (Boulder, CO, 2008).

**Alexandre Rands Barros** is Professor of Economics at the Federal University of Pernambuco, Brazil. He is the author of many articles, including: 'How to make bankers richer: the Brazilian financial market with public and private banks', *The Quarterly Review of Economics and Finance*, May 2008, and 'A periodization of the business cycles in the Brazilian Economy', *Revista Brasileira de Economia*, January 1993.

**Ricardo Beczuk** is Professor of Economics at the Universidad Nacional de la Plata, and Visiting Professor at the Universidad San Andres, Argentina. He is also a Senior Visiting Researcher at the Central Bank of Argentina. His book *Asymmetric Information in Financial Markets: Introduction and Applications* (Cambridge, 2003) is a widely used textbook in intermediate and advanced courses in finance and banking in several countries.

**César Ciappa** is Associate Professor of Agricultural Finance and Economics at the Universidad de Belgrano, Argentina. He worked as a consultant on Agricultural Finance and Economics for the Inter-American Development Bank, the Corporación Andina de Fomento and the Argentine Ministries of Economics and Agriculture. He was also consultant to the Presidency of the Republic of Ecuador. He is a co-author of the book *Economic and Social Impact Evaluation of Public Policy in the Argentine Agroindustrial Chain* (La Plata, Argentina, 2007) and the author of *Agroindustrial Policy: Agroindustrial Sustainable Growth* (Buenos Aires, 2009).

**Donald N. Coes** is Professor Emeritus of Economics at the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque, USA. He is the author of many articles on international trade and on the Brazilian economy, including

*Macroeconomic Crises, Policies, and Growth in Brazil, 1964–90* (Washington, DC, 1995).

**Lawrence De Geest** is a graduate student at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst, USA.

**Atilio Elizagaray** is Professor and Director of the Department of Economics at the National University of La Plata, Argentina. He is also the Executive Director of the Masters Program in Public Finance at that university. He was consultant to the World Bank, General Coordinator of the General Program of Technical Assistance of the Social Services Administration. He is the author of many articles on public finance.

**Adolfo Figueroa** is Professor Emeritus of Economics at the Pontificia Universidad Católica del Peru in Lima, and currently Researcher at the Centrum Business School of that university. He has published many books and articles in the field of economic growth and income distribution. His latest book is *A Unified Theory of Capitalist Development* (Lima, 2009).

**David Fleischer** is the Representative for Southern Brazil and Uruguay at the Inter-American Foundation (IAF), Arlington, Virginia, USA, and currently the Executive Director of the Brazilian Studies Association. He has a PhD in Cultural Anthropology and conducts research on environmental conservation and community-based development projects in Brazil and Mexico. His focus is on political ecology and sustainable livelihoods as well as the economic impacts of conservation on local markets.

**Manuel A.R. da Fonseca** is Professor of Economics and Finance at the Federal University of Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. He is currently the Head of that university's MBA program in Finance and Risk Management. He has published books on Applied Linear Algebra to Finance, Economics and Econometrics, and on Planning and Economic Development. He has worked as a consultant in macroeconomic planning and forecasting.

**Andrés Gallo** is Associate Professor of Economics and Director of the International Business Program at the Coggin College of Business, University of North Florida, USA. His research and teaching interests include Latin American economic development, property rights in agriculture, institutions, international economies and political economy, as well as law and economies in property rights and the internet.

**Esteban Manuel Greco** is a consultant in the fields of regulatory economies and competition policy, with special experience in the energy sector. He was Commissioner and Chief Economist at the National Commission of

Competition Defense (CNDC) and Deputy Manager of Performance and Economics at the National Entity of Gas Regulation (ENARGAS). He is also Professor of Economics of Regulation at the Center for the Study of Energy Regulatory Activity (CEARE) and teaches at the University of Buenos Aires Law School, Argentina.

**Joaquim J.M. Guilhoto** is Professor of Economics at the University of São Paulo (USP), Brazil. He was visiting Professor at MIT in 2010 and the Head of the Department of Economics at USP from 2005 to 2009. He is associate with the Regional Economics Application Laboratory (REAL) at the University of Illinois. For more than 20 years he specialized in the structural analysis of national and regional economies. Lately he has been focussing his research on questions related to energy, natural resources and environmental economies. He has more than 200 works published in his field of research, including books, papers and book chapters.

**Geoffrey J.D. Hewings** is Professor of Geography and Regional Science at the University of Illinois in Urbana-Champaign, USA, and directs the Regional Economics Application Laboratory (REAL) at that university. He has served as President of the Regional Science Association International. He has published and edited many books and articles. The books include: *Structure and Structural Change in the Brazilian Economy* – co-edited with J.M. Guilhoto – (London, 2001), *Equity Distortion in Regional Resource Allocation in Brazil* (co-edited with W. Baer) (New York, 2006) and *Structure and Structural Change in the Chilean Economy* (co-edited with P. Aroca (London, 2006)).

**Daniel Heymann** received his Licenciante in Economics and Physics at the Universidad de Buenos Aires, Argentina. He received his PhD in Economics at the University of California, Los Angeles, USA. He is Professor of Economics at the Universities of San Andrés, Buenos Aires and La Plata. He was Senior Economist at CEPAL, Buenos Aires.

**Rodolfo Hoffmann** was from 1966 to 1996 Professor of Economics at the University of São Paulo at Piracicaba, Brazil. Since 1997 he has been Professor of Economics at the Institute of Economics at the University of Campinas. He has written books on statistics for economists, econometrics, measures of inequality and poverty. His main areas of research are the analysis of income distribution, distribution of land tenure, and the modernization of Brazilian agriculture.

**Andrew W. Horowitz** is Professor of Economics at the Sam M. Walton College of Business at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, USA. He

has served as analyst for the Congressional Budget Office, was a Fulbright Scholar in Brazil, consulted with the Inter-American Development bank, and accompanied and advised a US Congressional trade mission to Brazil. He has published articles in many journals, including *The American Economic Review*, *The International Economic Review* and *The Journal of Development Economics*.

**Bernardo Kosacoff** is Professor Titular at both the Universidad Nacional de Quilmes and the Universidad de Buenos Aires, Argentina. He was director of CEPAL-United Nations in Argentina from 2002 to 2010. He is currently the Academic Director of the Centro Empresa, Competitividad y Desarrollo (CECyD) at the Instituto Tecnológico de Buenos Aires – Universidad de San Andrés (ITBA–UdeSA). He is the author of 26 books and over 100 articles. He is the recipient of the Premio Konex Platino for his work in the field of development economies.

**Andrés López** is Director of the Centro de Investigaciones para la Transformación (CENIT), Buenos Aires, Argentina, and Head of the Department of Economics, University of Buenos Aires. He is Full Professor at the University of Buenos Aires and Invited Professor at the University of San Andrés. He has written extensively on issues related to industrial development, trade and foreign investment. He has been a consultant to several internal organizations, such as the Inter-American Development Bank, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO), the International Labour Organization (ILO), the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) and the World Bank.

**Joseph L. Love** is Professor Emeritus of History at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, USA; he currently directs the Lemann Institute of Brazilian Studies at that university, where he was formerly Director of the Center for Latin American and Caribbean Studies. He is interested in the history of ideas, policy, and performance in Brazil and in Latin America as a whole. He is the author of *Rio Grande do Sul and Brazilian Regionalism*, *São Paulo in the Brazilian Federation* and *Crafting the Third World: Theorizing Underdevelopment in Romania and Brazil* (all from Stanford University Press). In addition, he has authored some 70 scholarly articles and essays and has co-edited four books, including *Brazil under Lula* (2009), with Werner Baer.

**Sergio Petralia** is an Invited Researcher at the Universidad de San Andrés, Argentina. He obtained his Master's degree at the Universidad de San Andrés and his BA degree in Economics at the Universidad de Buenos Aires.

**Diego Petrecolla** is the President of GPR Economía SA. He teaches at the Universidad de Buenos Aires, the Universidad Torcuato Di Tella and the Universidad de San Andrés, Argentina. He is a consultant to the IDB and the World Bank on Competition Policy. He is the author of many books and of papers published in domestic and international journals.

**Adrián Ramos** is a Regional Advisor to the United Nations Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean, and a Lecturer at the University of Buenos Aires, Argentina.
