Anjo G. Harryvan studied history and law at the Free University of Amsterdam and worked as a PhD researcher at the European University Institute in Florence. Currently he is a lecturer in international relations at the department of International Relations and International Organisation at the University of Groningen. His publications focus on history of and contemporary issues in European integration and Dutch foreign policy.

He publishes widely on a variety of topics relating to European law and is a guest lecturer at the Free University of Amsterdam, the University of Amsterdam and the University of Maastricht.

Senka Neuman Stanivukovic is an Assistant Professor at the International Relations department of the University of Groningen. Her research focuses on Europeanisation processes in East-Central and South-east Europe.

Tobias Nowak studied political science, sociology and public law at the University of Tübingen, Germany. He holds a PhD in law from the University of Groningen.
