## ABOUT ILERA

The International Industrial Relations Association (IIRA) was established in 1966 in response to a growing need to develop and exchange knowledge in the field of industrial relations, at the international level, and to provide the academic and the practitioner with a forum for discussion and research. Its founding members were the British Universities Industrial Relations Association, the Industrial Relations Research Association (USA), the International Institute for Labour Studies (Switzerland) and the Japan Institute of Labour.

Over the years, the Association broadened its scope of subject matter to include issues such as the transnational movement of labour, non-standard work, labour market regulation and trade and labour standards, and discrimination in employment. In 2010, it was decided to change its name to International Labour and Employment Relations Association (ILERERA) to reflect this new world of work, the broader subject matter and the reality of developing country labour markets.

Today ILERA has over 1000 members worldwide, including prominent industrial relations scholars and practitioners, and 35 national associations which together form the ILERA Council.

The Association also proposes study groups on particular issues of interest and has established several prizes to award young emerging scholars, professionals and practitioners, and distinguished scholars known for their academic contributions to the study of labour and employment relations.

The aim of the ILERA is of a purely scientific character, without regard to political, philosophical or religious considerations. The Association does not endorse opinions on policy questions and its secretariat is currently located in the Governance and Tripartism Department of the International Labour Office.
