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Rowland Atkinson is Chair in Inclusive Societies at the University of Sheffield, UK. Rowland is an urban sociologist with a strong interest in the urban and spatial consequences of social divisions. He has carried out extensive research on household displacement from gentrification, social exclusion and housing policy interventions and the rise of gated communities. Most recently, his work has focused on the impact of wealth and the wealthy on urban life.

Nick Bailey is Professor of Urban Studies at the University of Glasgow, UK. He has long-standing interests in the analysis of welfare in urban areas and how the geography of welfare alters under the impacts of market- and policy-driven changes. He is Director of the ESRC-funded Urban Big Data Centre and Associate Director of the Scottish Centre for Administrative Data Research. Both centres are pioneering the use of novel forms of data and analytical approaches for policy-relevant urban research.

Willem R. Boterman is Assistant Professor in Urban Geography at the Department of Geography, Planning and International Development Studies of the University of Amsterdam, the Netherlands. His work centres around spatial reproduction of gender and class in space, focusing on issues of gentrification, segregation and school choice.

Åsa BråmÅ has a PhD in human geography from Uppsala University, Sweden. Her research interests are found at the intersection between population geography and urban social geography. She has written on issues related to ethnic and socioeconomic segregation, neighbourhood dynamics and anti-segregation policy, mainly within a Swedish context. The research reported in this volume was carried out at the Institute for Housing and Urban Research, Uppsala University, where she was a researcher for many years.

Adalberto Cardoso has a PhD in sociology from the University of São Paulo, Brazil and is Associate Professor at the Institute of Social and Political Studies of the State University of Rio de Janeiro (IESP-UERJ). Among his fields of research are the economic, political and historical sociology of work, social structure and dynamics, urban studies, and social theory.

Roberta Cucca is Associate Professor of Urban Sustainability in the Department of Urban and Regional Planning at the Norwegian University of Life Sciences, Norway. Her research focuses on the relation between environmental policies and social vulnerability; social inequalities in contemporary cities; and participation in local policy decision making.

Ray Forrest held full-time posts at the universities of Birmingham and Bristol, UK, and City University of Hong Kong. He was Head of the School for Policy Studies at Bristol from 2001 to 2005 and Head of the Department of Public Policy at City University from 2012 to 2017. His last position was as Research Professor in Cities and Social Change and Director of the Centre for Social Policy and Social Change at Lingnan University, Hong Kong. He was Emeritus Professor of Urban Studies at Bristol, Fellow of the UK Academy of Social Sciences and Distinguished Professor at the Open University of Hong Kong.

Danilo França is a Post-Doctoral Researcher in the Center for Population Studies (NEPO) at the State University of Campinas (Unicamp), Brazil. He did his PhD research in sociology in the University of São Paulo. His interests include residential segregation, race relations, racial inequalities and social stratification. He is currently working on a comparative study about residential segregation by race and class in different Brazilian metropolises.

Feicui Gou is a PhD Researcher at Wuhan University, People's Republic of China. Her research examines the segregation of rural migrants in post-reform Chinese cities and investigates its dynamics and effects.

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Hang Kei Ho is a Researcher in Sociology at the University of Helsinki, Finland. He previously worked in academic positions in the Netherlands, Sweden and the UK lecturing across the fields of Asian Studies, Business Management, Development Studies, Economic Geography and Public Health.
